Historical Milestones

1776 First anti-slavery society in NJ founded by FitzRandolph, Hance and others

1777 - Whigs confiscate Quaker cattle & corn for non-payment of war taxes

- Hartshorn FitzRandolph resigns as Mayor for duration of War

1779, 1780 - Washington secures food for troops from Quaker farmers in Shongum

1800... Mott Hollow mills established along the Mill Brook

1801 - Quaker School opens

1821 Benjamin Lundy begins *Genius of Universal Emancipation*,
first long-running anti-slavery newspaper

1830s... Richard and Mary Brotherton provide safe haven
for run-away slaves on their farm

1844 Jacob Lundy Brotherton locked out of Millbrook & other churches
when attempting to organize anti-slavery meetings

1865 Randolph Friends Meeting ends; last members of meeting,
Rachel Vail & James Brotherton, maintain property until 1898

1898 Friends Meeting House and Cemetery Association
founded to preserve Meeting House and
Cemetery; acquire site

1936 Meeting House painted white

1939 First historical tours
for school children

1954 Dover-Randolph Friends
Meeting established
